| <p>Identify one or more EHR champions or don't implement.</p> <p>Make sure your organization's senior executive fully supports the EHR.</p> <p>Use an experienced, skilled project manager.</p> <p>Utilize sound change management principles.</p> <p>Have clear, measurable goals.</p> <p>Make sure users share your goals.</p> <p>Establish realistic expectations.</p> <p>Don't try to implement an EHR in a dysfunctional organization.</p> | <p>Plan, plan, plan.</p> <p>Redesign your workflow.</p> <p>Don't automate processes just because you can; make sure the automation improves something.</p> <p>Design a balanced scanning strategy.</p> <p>Consistently enter key data into your new EHR charts.</p> <p>Get data into the EHR electronically when possible.</p> <p>Utilize a phased implementation.</p> <p>Train, train, train.</p> <p>Be flexible in your documentation strategy and allow individual differences in style.</p> <p>Don't "go live" on a Monday.</p> <p>Lighten your workload when you "go live" and for a short period afterward.</p> <p>Don't underestimate how much time and work is involved in becoming "expert" with an EHR.</p> <p>Pick a vendor with an excellent reputation for support.</p> <p>Utilize "power users" at each site.</p> | <p>Don't scrimp on your IT infrastructure.</p> <p>If you're a small practice, consider an application service provider (ASP) model.</p> <p>Make sure that your IT personnel do adequate testing.</p> <p>Utilize expert IT advice when it comes to servers and networks.</p> <p>Make sure your servers and interfaces are maintained on a daily basis.</p> <p>Back up your database at least daily.</p> <p>Have a disaster recovery plan and test it.</p> |
